JOHN BANNISTER IN THE SPOTLIGHT



John Bannister, as most of you know, has been the dedicated and much-appreciated President of the National Croquet Club Board for two years. Here he is interviewed by **Bob Rochedieu** to outline the administrative structure under which the Club operates, and share his insights on the coming year.

John, how long have you been associated with the National Croquet Club (the "Club")?

In 2015, just by luck, my wife and daughter, who lives in NYC, stumbled upon the National Croquet Center, (the 'NCC'), when searching for a wedding venue. Our daughter's wedding there was delightful, and we were intrigued by what the NCC had to offer in the way of the sport of croquet. As I was still working in international sales, traveling worldwide and managing an office in Dubai, it was not the time to join.

When I retired in 2017, Carol and I joined the Club so that we would have an activity to do together, and mostly get me out of the house! That was a game changer. It has made retirement so enjoyable, not only learning new skills and challenging myself to be a better player, but meeting new people. I also serve on the committee in the Special Olympics Croquet program where I volunteer.

In 2020, I was elected to the Club's Board of Directors, chosen as President. and reelected in January 2022. My focus has been on membership growth and retention, streamlining our procedures and documents, and improving committee effectiveness to be more responsive to member needs. We initiated an annual audit, and its minor recommendations were, or are, being implemented.

Will you briefly describe the relationship between the National Croquet Club, the Croquet Foundation of America, and the National Croquet Center?

I'm happy you asked that as it confuses everyone! The Foundation is a fully tax-exempt 501(c3) not-for-profit corporation that owns and operates the NCC. A self-governing Board of Directors manages it. All front-office staff, the grounds crew, and the Croquet Pro are Foundation employees.

2023, ANOTHER BANNER YEAR FOR THE NCC! From the Desk of the Chairman

As the Croquet Foundation of America (CFA) starts another season at the National Croquet Center (NCC), I'm pleased to report on plans that will enhance everyone's experience at the NCC, along with comments about finances and an introduction to the CFA Board.

Expansion. The CFA, which owns and operates the NCC, has completed a long list of improvements, seen & unseen, with much more in the works! Among other things, we're gearing up to add six new croquet courts, five in the back on ground-level lawns and one by the pond, a 50 percent expansion! We are also planning major enhancements in the bar and ballrooms, adding an electronic Recognition Wall, and purchasing the adjoining 2.3-acre property at 885 West Patrick Circle, including a house, two storage buildings, and room for four additional courts!



Finances. The Club's Space Sharing Agreement with the CFA (funded by your membership dues) will cover about 40% of the Center's \$1.1M basic operating cost this year. That is up substantially from past years, based on excellent membership growth. The balance of our earned income is covered by outside events that promote the sport, rental income from Sandy James Fine Food & Productions (caterer) and the USCA, court rentals, and the Pro Shop.

Did you know that croquet became the first outdoor game played by women and the first sport played by men and women together?

There were strict "moral codes" back then. A lady's ankle had never been revealed before in public, and, this forbid, sometimes happened when searching for the ball under her skirt! When balls rolled off the court into the bushes, it was hard to retrieve them in a long skirt. There were many concerns that flirtations during the game created hurt feelings, and physicians warned that constant play could curve the spine. Those were the good old days going back to the 1800s.

Those intriguing facts come from The National Croquet Museum being launched online by the Croquet Foundation of America (CFA). Its purpose is to preserve the history of croquet in the U.S. and inspire those who are curious about croquet to learn more. Spearheaded by CFA Chairman **David McCoy**, Museum Historian **Mary Shields**, and Director **June Rochedieu**, the Museum promises to be a very exciting and prestigious addition to the growing sport of croquet.

(ONE LAST) TIP FROM THE PRO, JACK RUSH

Stop the Twist!

A common question I get asked is why am I missing shots even though I am lined up? Most people believe it is a result of them thinking they are lifting their head. While that can be the case occasionally, majority of the time I see that they are moving their mallet head. This is commonly a result of twisting in their grip.

When you grip the mallet, it is important to keep your grip loose. This helps keep the small muscles in your hands relaxed. Keeping these muscles relaxed is vital. I will see players want to grip tighter right before they make contact with the ball. If you hold your mallet with a loose grip and then tighten, the mallet head will shift on you, leading you to miss hit shots.

What is the solution? The answer is very straightforward. Keep the grip loose and the muscles relaxed. A little trick that I use is, take a deep breath before I swing. I would encourage players to utilize some trick to relax themselves before making a shot. Your swing will be smoother and more accurate. HAVE FUN AND SHOOT STRAIGHT!



The Club has a 'Space Sharing and Operating Agreement' with the Foundation under which the Club transfers monthly amounts to the Foundation to share the cost of using the facilities and the personnel. When we use the acronym NCC, it refers to the National Croquet Center; the Club is simply "the Club."

What is the configuration of the Club Board of Directors?

The Club Board consists of seven members, including four Directors elected by Club members at the Club's Annual General Meeting in December who then serve as officers. The other three Board positions are the CFA Board President and two others appointed by him from among its Board members. CFA Board members are also Club members. The Club Board President holds a permanent position on the Foundation Board and attends all meetings ex-officio.

How do you see 2023 concerning events and tournaments at the NCC?

2023 will be a very active year for tournaments, corporate and private events. We are preparing schedules to show everyone those dates well in advance, especially the tournament and corporate events. We encourage Club members to assist at corporate events as they are a major revenue source for the NCC.

We anticipate a great year ahead for our Club! The most exciting news for me is the 50 percent increase in the number of courts. As of today, the Club has 475 active members and that may grow to 500 members by year-end. Thanks for the generous efforts and work by the Croquet Foundation of America for providing such a fine croquet-playing venue and experience for our members at the National Croquet Center.

Little Fun Fact

The game evolved from paille-maille (French: "pall-mall"), which was played in France at least as early as the 13th century and introduced into England in the 16th century.

In addition to earned income, we hold fundraising events and solicit donations, which added upwards of \$200,000 this year, with a significant portion coming from CFA Board members. In comparison, we expect total operating and capital expenses this year to exceed \$2.3M, with the difference being covered by debt. This lets us move forward promptly with our plans. Specific fundraising and donations to the Legacy Fund will be used to fund projects and pay off debt. The generous support of Club members in this regard is encouraged and greatly appreciated.

Board of Directors. The CFA Board is composed of the following members, all of whom are actively involved in finding ways to make the Center an even finer place for the enjoyment of Club members and the public. Its members are David McCoy, Chairman & CEO; Hal Denton, President & COO; Mike Gibbons, Executive VP; Conner Helms, VP Legal; Ruth Summers, VP-Strategic Planning; Tom Tribby, Secretary; Trudy Crowetz, Treasurer; Directors Stuart Baker, Randy Cardo, and David Kepner; Damon Bidencope (ex officio – as USCA President); and John Bannister (ex officio – as National Croquet Club President). Former Director Joy Diesel is on our Advisory Board. All CFA Board members are also members of the Club.

I will close by saying how grateful the CFA Board is for the outstanding volunteer participation and other support we receive from the National Croquet Club's members and its Board. We are working together as a team to make the National Croquet Center the finest and most fun location in the world for croquet!
